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## Happy New Year! A Brief History of New Year Resolutions

It is the beginning of a new year and many of us have made resolutions. Have you ever wondered where the tradition came from? Let's take a look.

The beginning of making resolutions dates back to the Babylonians. During their 12-day festival celebrating a new year in spring, Babylonians made pledges to the gods to return all borrowed items and pay all debts. If they followed through the gods would look favorably upon them.

Circa 46 B.C., Roman Emperor Julius Caesar created a new calendar that began on January one. The month was named after Janus, the two-faced god who could look backward and forward at the same time and the guardian of doorways and arches. On the first of the new year, Romans, believing that Janus would look back into their past and look to the future, offered sacrifices to the god promising good conduct in the year to come.

John Wesley, founder of the Methodist church, began holding Covenant Renewal Services in 1740, on either New Year's Eve or New Year's Day. These had a spiritual theme to them and often involved the congregation making resolutions based on Bible verses. The practice continued to change and became more secular in the following years where, rather than making promises to be better Christians, the focus was placed on self-improvement and the only person you were accountable to was yourself.

Today approximately 45% reported to making resolutions, and only about 8% kept them. This has prompted author Lisa Scottoline to make "unresolutions"; preferring to look at what she has done right and resolve to continue doing them. This may include things like eating pasta, watching cooking shows, and reading books.

Here at BCHA, we like to make resolutions of what we want to accomplish in the coming year and we like to

celebrate what we have accomplished in the past year, none of which we can do without you.

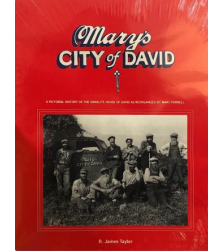
